My own flotilla 83 is now the epitome of the mouse that roared. They have grown to be a very active part of the Division. Fl. 84 is an unofficial base for the Division as well as various activities throughout the year. Fl. 86 has a wonderful member training program which is open to all members. DIVISION 8 FIRST QUARTER REPORT - 2013

General Information:

At the January Annual Orientation, the Division and all flotillas presented their Mission Statements and Strategic Plans for 2013. All flotillas report they are pursuing their goals and using their plans as guidelines.

US Coast Guard Support:

- Sixteen Division 8 members from Flotillas 81, 83, 84, 86 and 87 assisted at Sector St. Petersburg's Annual Open House. Randy Moritz and crew provided on-the-water security. Others provided security or worked at the Public Affairs Information Booth which displayed an OPFAC from **Flotilla 83**.
- 2 OPFACs participated in the Gasparilla on-the-water parade.
- Paulette Parent and Toni Borman taught **AUXCHEF** classes at Station Ft. Lauderdale, Air Station Clearwater and Sector Key West. A total of 34 members completed the class and will now complete their PQSs.
- Bill Gerst, Pollution Inspector, has been called out 3 times by Sector to investigate suspected spills.
- Toni Borman co-instructed ICS 210 with COMO Walter Jaskiewicz - 12 participants.
- Dick Petrucci attended the Annual Aviation Workshop at CGAS Borinquen (Aquadilla, P.R.), March 2-3.
- Bob Fesko performed approximately 90 hours as Watchstander at Sta. Cortez. Bill Beckett performed 15 hours as USCG Station Crew trainee. T. Allen Jones performed approx. 120 hours at Sta. Cortez as Watchstander trainee. OPFAC Bonnie Sea and crew provided weekly OTW training support to Station Cortez assets.
- Ron Howington and Ron Touchton gave weekly five-hour training class to new Coast Guard personnel and Auxiliarists in chart reading, operations and watch standing. On Thursdays Ron Touchton conducts two boat drills for new Coast Guard personnel and Auxiliarists. Jane Touchton helps with miscellaneous station activities.
- **Flotilla 86** has completed work on their Mobile Communications Trailer.
- **Flotilla 83** has completed work on their Mobile Communications Trailer except for exterior graphics.

The Value of a USCG ID

In November 2012, my wife and I took a cruise to the Middle East. Our exit city was Cairo, Egypt. At the end of our tour, we were driven to the Cairo International Airport. We were booked on a British Airways flight to London and then home. When our turn came, we approached the desk and a young man took our documents. He then started punching his computer, punched it a second time, looked a little puzzled, and continued to punch. After 4-5 minutes, he excused himself and brought over a supervisor.

I asked what the problem was and the supervisor informed me that the credit card I was carrying was not the same that we used to purchase the ticket. I explained to him that about 3 months previous, I received a call from AMEX asking if I had ordered \$300 worth of golf equipment. They explained that my records have never indicated any previous charges for golf. I told them I had not ordered such a thing and they informed me that my card numbers had been compromised and requested that I immediately cut up my card and they would forward a new one which I would receive the following morning.

The supervisor looked extremely puzzled and after a minute or two of hesitation, asked if I had any other photo ID. At that point, I pulled out my USCG ID. He took one look at it, then at me, his eyes widened, he profusely apologized for the delay, and then he escorted us to the gate. I guess a USCG ID has a lot of value.

TAKING SEMPER PARATUS TO A HIGHER LEVEL

Semper Paratus is the Coast Guard's motto; it means always prepared, but in a manner of speaking it also means Quick Response. In fact if you call it QR for short you'd be talking about those funny looking code squares that are popping up in ads in magazines and newspapers and on signs in airports or wherever someone with a message wants to reach the "early adopters". Basically anyone with a "smart phone" can aim their phone's camera at the QR code and be immediately transported to a website.

Graham Leadbetter has taken these Quick Response codes to a new level. Leadbetter, the VFC of Flotilla 87 in Englewood Florida, has a history of computer literacy, and once he saw the QR code he reasoned that many of the folks he sees launching their boats every weekend carry "smart phones", and so he has designed a QR code for use on Flotilla business cards which he hands out to boaters.

"Every time we do a vessel exam or answer boater's questions down at the launch ramp we hand out one of these cards," he said. "And when the boater scans our code they get today's local weather and tides. They also get a link to our website which features our safe boating classes, highlights what we do, and suggests they consider joining the Auxiliary."

"There is also the opportunity to add videos", Leadbetter says smiling, "but our video needs much improvement, right now the only video I have is one of me at the helm of a boat." This is one area where he concedes he needs some help. Flotilla 87 has printed the QR code on stickers that are applied to business cards and to maps of the AOR that they give away. They also have them posted on monofilament fishing line collection bins."

Obviously Leadbetter and his Flotilla members are proud of the progress they have made with the QR code. "We're pretty sure this is the first application of a QR code anywhere in the Auxiliary," he notes. It's a nice tight program and it works. But they are so far ahead of the "curve" in this effort, that to make it all happen Leadbetter had to learn some code, and search for a QR code generator.

He credits a speech he attended in which the speaker talked a bit about the QR code system, he was so charmed with the possibilities, he invited her to an Auxiliary Officers Meeting so the other members could see what he was talking about. In his effort to adopt the code he had to persevere without any teacher to help show him the way, although he confessed, "I did purchase a book on programming web sites for mobile devices, and I found some code snippets on the internet."

A self professed computer nerd, Leadbetter spent the last years of his professional life as a systems designer/programmer for the U.S.Army. When he retired back in 2008, he moved to Florida and quickly joined the Coast Guard Auxiliary. Since joining he has served as FSO-CS and FSO-IS. He presently serves as VFC. Leadership--For You?

Having trouble getting members in your flotilla to run for office? Do you need a commander or Vice Commander for the coming year or a year from now? Do you have Staff Officer positions that lie vacant? Or better yet, are you thinking you might want to try an office?

One of the most difficult things in any organization is finding members who are willing to step up and meet the leadership challenge. There is either fear of the position itself because of lack of knowledge or the idea of stepping into the leadership of an organization may be overwhelming because there is not enough information about the skill required.

Every organization offers leadership courses and members are encouraged to get their feet wet by seeking the skill set involved in the particular position of interest. The Auxiliary has a number of courses that are designed to feed you knowledge about volunteer or elected offices, and some are set up to divine your particular bent by offering settings or situations whereby you see your qualities for leadership emerge. These generally are courses where you work in groups, problem solve or evaluate and give responses to those who demonstrate positive or negative leadership skills. Some courses are online and you can work at your leisure reading and answering questions that pertain to different forms of leadership. Others are classroom based and meet just a few times a year in pre-determined venues.

Regardless of which course you choose or how you opt to learn about positions of leadership, you still need to look at your options for assisting your volunteer group--whether flotilla, division, or district.

To assist you in determining the particular leadership position, look first at the requirements. Talk with previous members who held the job. Discuss options with leaders you admire or talk with members whom you believe might steer you in the direction of gaining knowledge about your interest. You can do several things. Think about your life before retirement; what made you successful there. What were your strengths; how did you achieve or move up in position. Take a skill evaluation or ask your best friend what he or she feels your strong points are and whether he thinks you might have the qualities to try a position of leadership. Of more importance how do you feel about developing your skills? Are you motivated to grow into a position?

Most who have joined our volunteer organization do so because they think they have something to offer and they are motivated to learn something new. Those two qualities are the guiding light for those who may strive for a leadership position. Take stock in yourself, in your skills, in your will to grow, in your desire to work with others to learn. No position exists in a vacuum and each office is molded from existing guidelines and also around the person who takes it on and bends it to fit his or her read on the best way to move the office forward and make it more than it was before.

Take a class in the thing that peaks your interest. There is a Flotilla Leadership Course which is taught in the classroom and is also online. There is AUXLAMs, part A and B. There are also courses offered for almost every flotilla office--Public Affairs, Publications, Information Systems, Communications Services/ Website Development, and Flotilla Commander. Most of these courses may be taken by members without previous qualifications.

Previous officers in a position are often the best mentors or coaches for budding leaders and these folks are willing to assist you in learning the particular techniques or avenues for gaining knowledge and skills in your field of interest.

We all grow into the positions we hold; few rarely start off running, knowing all there is to know. Remember, you joined the Auxiliary to donate your time or your special skill and to learn new things. Expand your knowledge base and your interest and join those in leadership positions!

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
